THE REGISTRAR OF THE UNIVERSITY

To the President of the University:

SIR—The year 1945-46 will long be remembered by college admission officers throughout this country as a most strenuous one. Between the time of V-E Day and V-J Day, and particularly immediately following V-J Day, the volume of work in the Admissions Division of this office increased so rapidly that it was most difficult to handle it satisfactorily. Extra helpers were hard to secure and those available were not trained for the work.

In this very busy period it was indeed encouraging to receive complete co-operation from the other units of the University in securing all of the helpers requested. We desire to extend a word of thanks to all of the other offices on the campus for lending us aid during this very trying period. We particularly desire to thank the staff of the Veterans Service Bureau for supplying us promptly with test reports on examinations taken by prospective freshmen. Without this co-operation our task would have been even more difficult.

The enrollment increased remarkably during the year. The enrollment of veterans increased from something over 2,200 in the fall of 1945 to more than 6,300 in the spring of 1946, and the prospects are for almost twice that many in the fall of 1946. Further comments on enrollments are given in this report under the Statistical Division.

Personnel.—Changes in our staff during the year were numerous and frequent. There seemed to be an almost complete lack of seriousness of purpose on the part of many persons who accepted positions. A more serious handicap was the almost complete unwillingness to assume responsibility on the part of many new members of the staff. This resulted in many persons leaving after only a short period of service. Toward the end of the year, however, we were very fortunate in our selection of new helpers, and we now feel that we have a staff of well-trained and sincere workers who are carrying their proportionate share of responsibilities.

Assistant Registrar Robert L. Williams left our staff during the year to accept a position as Administrative Assistant in the Office of the Provost. The position of Assistant Registrar was filled by the appointment of Edward G. Groesbeck, who came to our staff immediately following his release from the service.

Entrance examinations.—Subject entrance examinations and aptitude tests were held during the three regular periods in August, February, and June, and at special times in September and October. In August, ten applicants took the entrance examinations, and twenty-four the aptitude tests. In September, a special group of seven was given the aptitude tests; in October, one applicant took a special examination to certify his credit in two units of French. In February, subject examinations were written by

six and aptitude tests by seven. The third regularly scheduled examination period for the year 1945-46 was during the first week in June, and at this time six applicants took entrance examinations and six others were given the aptitude tests. Thus, subject entrance examinations were administered to twenty-three candidates because they were not eligible for acceptance on certificate. In addition, the aptitude tests were written by forty-four applicants whose secondary school records left us in doubt as to their preparedness for the freshman program.

Publications.—Assembling and preparing copy for three of the official publications remained the duty of one of the assistants in this office who handled this work before the transfer of the Editorial Division from the Registrar's Office to the University Press.

The permanent faculty card file maintained in this office and the lists of graduates approved by the Regents formed the basis of the 1945-46 *Register of Staff and Graduates*, which was revised somewhat this year to eliminate unnecessary and repetitious material. This bulletin is issued as soon as possible after the close of the fiscal year.

With the Army and Navy units still being maintained and with an increased civilian enrollment, the time required for compiling the 1945-46 *Register of Students* from the registration cards obviously was considerably greater than in previous years. This publication, also, issued as soon as possible after the close of the fiscal year, forms a permanent record of every student who has registered at the University, regardless of length of attendance; 100 per cent withdrawals are, of course, excluded.

Early in the calendar year preparations were begun for copy for the *University Directory*. Departmental offices co-operated fully in enabling us to issue the 1945-46 *Directory* shortly after the opening of the fall term, when it was urgently needed.

The faculty file previously referred to is used throughout the year in checking names, degrees, and titles on copy for all official University publications referred to this office by the Editorial Office.

Principal-freshman conference.—With war travel restrictions modified and campus accommodations again available it was possible to resume our annual principal-freshman conference canceled during the war years of 1943 and 1944. The seventeenth of these annual conferences was held on November 15, 1945.

One hundred fifty representatives of 108 Michigan and four out-of-state high schools and seven Michigan junior colleges held interviews during the morning in the Rackham Building with their former students who entered the University for the first time at the beginning of the fall term. Because of the late opening of the term no progress reports of studies were available, but the principals were furnished with the scores of the Orientation Period tests. The individual interviews lasted approximately fifteen minutes each, and through them the principals were enabled to learn first hand of any problems confronting their former students in regard to high-school preparation and University adjustment.

Luncheon was served in the Michigan League Ballroom to the out-of-town visitors and members of the University faculty who come in contact with new students. "Common Objectives of Education in High School and College" was the topic of the discussion program which followed.

The principals' comments and letters leave no doubt as to the effective results of these annual meetings both from the standpoint of the high schools in preparing college students and of the University in its orientation and instruction of freshmen. We are grateful to those in charge of the Rackham Building and the Michigan League for their continued co-operation in making the conferences successful.

Honors Convocation.—With the increased enrollment this year there was a corresponding rise in the number of students honored at the twenty-third annual Honors Convocation on April 26, 1946. They were grouped as follows:

The exercises held last year at the Rackham Building, because of an anticipated decreased attendance, were resumed this year in Hill Auditorium, where Professor John P. Dawson addressed a good-sized audience. The work of collecting copy and preparing the program, arranging for the exercises, and sending invitations to honor students and their parents was handled as in previous years in the Registrar's Office.

ADMISSIONS DIVISION

Passing on applications from veterans and counseling with veterans who desired a college education were the chief concerns of the Admissions Division during the past year. Veterans' applications proved to be much more complicated than the usual freshman applications, and they entailed many personal conferences. Following the policy of the University with regard to the admission of veterans, a series of tests offered by the Psycho-

logical Testing Services was recommended to all veterans whose preparatory records failed to meet the usual entrance requirements. These tests were used as a second measure of the veteran's capacity and preparation for University work, and the veteran was granted admission more on his ability to learn than on what he already knew, provided, of course, that he had an adequate knowledge of the secondary courses fundamental to his proposed college program.

Many veterans called at the office to discuss their educational plans, and many of them returned for a second conference after the test results were available. Because of the large increase in the general mail, in the applications received, and in personal conferences, it was necessary to add two members to the staff of the Admissions Division, one to assist directly the admissions officer and one to assist with the clerical work.

The General Educational Development tests at the college level offered to men in the armed forces by the United States Armed Forces Institute have been accepted in some instances in place of the tests given by the Bureau of Psychological Services of the University. Not a great many applicants, however, have offered these tests in support of their applications.

We should like to express here our appreciation for the excellent service rendered to this division by the Bureau of Psychological Services in the way of testing and in counseling veterans whose admission to the University could not be approved because of inadequate qualifications.

Following the war schedule, the sixteen-week summer term opened July 2. There were 331 freshmen registered in this term as compared with 261 registered in the summer term of 1944. Even under the war pressure this has not been a popular term with entering freshmen nor has it proved to be a particularly satisfactory one for the beginning of a University program. It is the general opinion that the casualties among the freshmen are heavier in the summer term than in the normal college year.

For the fall term of 1945 all qualified applicants were admitted according to the usual practice. Early in November, however, it became apparent that because of the large number of veterans wishing to enter from Michigan some restriction would have to be placed on admissions from outside the state. In November we were instructed to reject all applications for the spring term from women who were not residents of the state and to hold in abeyance all applications from nonveteran men who were not residents of the state. It later became necessary to reject all of these men, and the only students admitted who were not residents of the state were some veterans and those to whom we had previously made commitments. The final registration count for the spring term showed 504 from Michigan and 110 non-residents. In February of the previous year we had had an entering freshman class totaling 253.

Regents-Alumni Scholarships.—These scholarships have added a considerable amount of work to this division for several reasons: (1) the increasing number of applications filed each year; (2) the tardiness with which the initial material has been sent to Michigan alumni clubs and high-school principals in the fall, no doubt due to the war schedule on which

the University has been operating and the pressure of work; and (3) the cumbersome way in which the applications for the scholarships and the applications for admission to the University, which accompanied them, have been handled. It is hoped that some system can be devised which will be an improvement over the present one.

Prognostic rating.—For the third year it has not been possible, because of the pressure of work under the war schedule, to include in the report the table on prognostic rating. It is hoped that with the new additions to the staff we shall be able to include it in the report for next year. It has been partly done during these last few years, and it has been reported to this division that the various officers engaged in personnel work with the freshmen hope that the rating, which is a prediction of the probable degree of success of the student in the University, will soon again be available for all entering freshmen.

Honor award.—The eighth annual honor award was granted as follows:

This is to certify that, among the groups of students entering the University of Michigan in 1945, from the high schools of the state of Michigan, the group from the Iron River High School, consisting of the following freshmen: Robert Philbrick Alley, Grace Dorothy Gendzwill, and Joyce Annette Gendzwill, by its combined record has received first honors for excellence in scholarship during the first term of residence study.

In making the above award the records of students entering throughout the calendar year, in February, June, and October, were considered.

Number of students per Michigan secondary school.—Of the 621 accredited high schools in Michigan, 234 were represented by the 937 freshmen who entered from Michigan in October, 1945, as compared with 183 high schools in the fall semester of 1937. Schools represented by only 1 student numbered 110, and each of 41 schools was represented by only 2 students. The high schools represented by the largest number of students were as follows: Ann Arbor High School, 44 students; Central High School, Detroit, 39 students; Redford High School, Detroit, 30 students; and Grosse Pointe High School, 30 students.

Reports to high-school principals and congratulatory letters to parents.—Although the distribution of students entering for the three terms which have been scheduled during the war years has shown that more students than usual entered in February and in June, the majority has still continued to enter in October. The practice of mailing to principals reports of grades for the first term of students entering in October has been continued. It has not been possible to extend these reports for those entering in June and in

February, though in a few instances we have sent the records on receiving requests for them from principals. The practice of writing congratulatory letters to principals whose high schools were represented by unusually good delegations was resumed this year. It had been discontinued for two years because of the pressure of work.

The practice adopted in 1931 of sending commendatory letters to parents of freshmen who had notably good records for the first semester was continued. Here again we were unable to extend this practice for those entering in June and in February.

RECORDS DIVISION

The increase in enrollment has been felt particularly by this division, which keeps the records for the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, College of Architecture and Design, School of Education, School of Forestry and Conservation, School of Music, and the School of Public Health. The records for these six schools entail checking every student's election card, recording the receipt of every admission, posting the current elections to the permanent record, and reviewing the student's entire record for repetition, sequence, and completion of provisional courses. Also group requirements were figured and completions posted on all the records of the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts and the School of Education. Totaling the records of the year 1944-45 and comparing that number with the total records kept throughout the three terms of 1945-46 show an increase of 42 per cent. Comparing the two spring terms of those years shows an increase of 75 per cent. The following table presents a comparison of the number of records kept, for civilians and Navy trainees during the two-year period, 1944-46:

Registration.—Registration for all the students in all the units of the University was held for each term in Barbour and Waterman gymnasiums. Naval R.O.T.C. students aided in the two and one-half day registration periods in the summer and fall. Because of naval regulations these men received no payment for their services. This office, however, expressed its appreciation to them for their excellent assistance. It was necessary to secure civilian assistants for the spring registration.

Classification.—All the students in the six schools mentioned above and those in the Graduate School classified by selecting their courses and turning in their class cards and election cards in Waterman Gymnasium at the time

of registration. Departmental representatives from these schools were on duty throughout the registration days to assist the students in arranging their programs of study and in the selection of sections within courses.

Degree programs.—Students in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts are admitted to various fields of concentration as soon as they have passed sixty hours or more with an average grade of at least C for all work elected and have satisfied the requirement of proficiency in English composition. Those with twenty-four or more hours on the degree program are considered to be of senior standing.

The number of civilian students in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts for the spring term of 1946 concentrating in the various fields is shown in the following table. The increase or decrease indicated represents the changes that have occurred between the spring term of the preceding year and this year.

The students with no field of concentration are those who become eligible to apply for admission to candidacy for a degree at the end of the spring term but will not select a field of concentration before the opening of school in the fall.

Senior checking.—Graduation requirements were checked and records kept for the senior students in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, the School of Education, the School of Music, and the School of Public Health by two members of the staff for the summer and fall terms of 1945. Another member was added to the staff for this work owing to the increase in enrollment in the spring of 1946. The degrees granted by the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts according to fields of concentration from July 1, 1945, to June 30, 1946, inclusive, are shown in the table on page 8. Degrees granted by other units served by this office are shown in the tabulation on pages 53 to 55.

Honors Convocation.—Early in the spring term every record kept in this office was carefully checked in accordance with the rules laid down by the Honors Convocation Committee to discover those students who should be honored in the twenty-third annual Honors Convocation, which was held on April 26, 1946. The data thus obtained were used as aids in determining the students to be invited to become members in the several honorary societies on campus.

Transcripts.—The number of transcripts issued and the amount of fees received each month for year beginning July 1, 1945, and ending June 30, 1946, follow:

STATISTICAL SERVICE

Enrollment.—Summer, 1945. With victory in Europe on May 8, 1945, it was evident that the anticipated gains in University enrollment would soon be realized. Although the 1945 summer resident enrollment of 7,615 was lower than the previous summer enrollment of 7,887, the losses were among military trainees only. Veteran registrations for the 1945 summer session and term increased to 386 from 113 the preceding summer, an increase of 242 per cent. For this period, nonveteran enrollment reached 4,984 from 4,312, a gain of 16 per cent. Trainees in the armed forces were still on the campus in large numbers, although there were only 2,249 military personnel compared to 3,463 of the summer before.

Fall, 1945. The 1945 fall resident enrollment increased to 11,847 from 9,887 in the fall of 1944. Veteran enrollment advanced to 2,231 from 355 the preceding fall, a gain of 528 per cent. Nonveterans for the fall period numbered 7,821, compared with the 1944 fall total of 6,728, a gain of 46 per cent. The expected sharp decrease in enrollment of armed forces trainees continued, with 1,843 military personnel in the the fall of 1945, compared with 2,804 in the fall of 1944.

Spring, 1946. The net total resident spring enrollment reached 14,481 from 9,278 in the spring of 1945. Prior to this time, the highest single term campus credit enrollment had been reached in the fall of 1939, when 12,132 students were in attendance.

The 1946 spring term enrollment of 6,362 veterans showed clearly the acceleration of military discharges, with a gain of more than 14½ times the 433 veterans registered for the previous spring term and an unusual increase of 185 per cent over the previous fall term, when 2,231 veterans were enrolled.

Although veteran enrollment showed an increase for the 1946 spring term over the fall figures, nonveteran enrollment followed the customary pattern, decreasing to 7,557 from 7,821 for the 1945 fall term. Comparison of 1946 spring nonveteran enrollments with those of the preceding spring shows a gain of 18 per cent. During the 1946 spring term, there were only 563 military personnel in training at the University.

Year, 1945-46. For the fiscal year 1945-46, 7,080 veterans and 14,768 nonveterans or armed forces trainees enrolled in resident credit programs, 264 veterans and 3,965 nonveterans enrolled in extramural credit or professional programs, and 936 veterans and 15,022 nonveterans enrolled in extramural noncredit programs, bringing the net grand total of students served by the University to 41,507.

Geographical distribution.—Study of the geographical locations from which students came for the year 1945-46 has been confined to veteran and nonveteran civilian enrollees at the University of Michigan, thus excluding military personnel under orders to attend. The number of students from Michigan increased to 63 per cent of the student body, from 61 per cent the preceding year.

Students from every state and from 55 countries, provinces, United

States territories or island possessions attended the University. New York was second to Michigan, Ohio third, and Illinois fourth in the number of students enrolled. Noteworthy increases from certain localities outside continental United States are shown, with the 1944-45 figures presented first and the 1945-46 second: Canada, 67-113; China, 91-148; Colombia, 44-65; Egypt, 1-7; Guatemala, 9-19; Hawaii, 12-20; India, 23-70; Panama, 6-14; Peru, 15-30; Philippine Islands, 9-26; Puerto Rico, 34-46; and South Africa, 2-10.

It is apparent that although the University continues to meet its primary obligation to the state, it is also a cosmopolitan institution. Because so many student representatives from other lands elect to receive their higher educational training at this institution, the University of Michigan is in the enviable position of being able to play an important role in the educational process that may bring about a better world.

Veterans.—A survey of student enrollment since the spring of 1943, made by the Institute for Human Adjustment and the Statistical Service of the Registrar's Office, shows that prior to the summer of 1944 there were fewer than 100 veterans in attendance. The fall of 1945 brought the first large increment of 2,231 veterans. In the spring of 1946, when 6,362 veterans were in attendance, 85 per cent of the students in the Law School were veterans, 85 per cent of those in the School of Forestry and Conservation, 78 per cent in the School of Business Administration, 70 per cent in the College of Engineering, 65 per cent in the Medical School, 55 per cent in the College of Pharmacy, 51 per cent in the School of Dentistry, 49 per cent in the College of Architecture and Design, 32 per cent in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, 32 per cent in the School of Music, 30 per cent in the Graduate School, 30 per cent in the School of Public Health, 28 per cent in the School of Education, and .0 per cent in the School of Nursing.

In addition to statistics of enrollment, the survey was concerned with the investigation of the characteristics of veterans. Veterans were from two to three years older than nonveterans. Of the married students, a larger proportion are veterans than are nonveterans. The largest proportion of veterans attending the University received benefits under Public Law 346. The return of large numbers of veterans has not affected the academic class structure of the University. Veterans are present at the freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, and graduate levels in approximately the same proportions as nonveterans. Veteran underclassmen have shown satisfactory ability to remain in school as previous investigations have shown. The greatest scholastic difficulty was experienced by the freshman group.

Veterans not only constitute a large proportion of many regular units of the University but are also enrolled in special training provided by various departments. One of these, the veteran preterm refresher course, is designed especially for veterans. A postgraduate medical and dental program consists in large part of veterans who feel the need for additional study of recent developments in their professions. From the professional standpoint, these programs constitute an important contribution. In addition, there has been

an increasing number of veterans enrolling in the University Extension Service courses.

Freshman enrollment and persistence.—Comparisons between the number of freshmen without previous college or university experience, admitted to the University of Michigan in 1944-45 and 1945-46, follow:

Spring, 1946, freshman registrations showed an increase similar to the unusual gain experienced in other University enrollments. The effect of the cessation of hostilities was clearly evident, since 471 of the 607 freshmen admitted in the spring were veterans.

Of the 1,492 freshmen with no previous college or university experience, admitted in the fall of 1945, 1,329 reregistered for the 1946 spring term. The 163 freshman losses between the opening of the 1945 fall and the beginning of the 1946 spring term were composed of 93 women, 54 nonveteran men, and 16 veteran men. This represents a 9.0 per cent withdrawal of the 1945 fall freshman women, 19.2 per cent of the nonveteran male freshmen; and 8.8 per cent of the fall veteran male freshmen. Some of the loss of nonveteran freshman men may be attributed to enlistment in the armed forces.

Freshman achievement.—Freshmen without any previous higher educational experience, admitted for the 1945 fall or the 1946 spring term, earned a grade point average of 2.41 for their first term of residence. The seventeen veteran women, with an average of 2.71, achieved highest scholastic honors for the freshman groups. In the second place, with an average of 2.45, were the nonveteran freshman women. Nonveteran freshman men earned an average of 2.39 and veteran freshman men 2.36.

Freshmen in the School of Music earned an average of 2.75 during their first term in the University. Forestry and Conservation freshmen earned 2.58, Literature, Science, and the Arts 2.44, Engineering 2.38, Architecture and Design 2.34, Nursing 2.19, Pharmacy 2.15, and freshmen in the School of Education 2.08.

Group achievement.—The following averages show comparative scholastic achievement by the various campus groups, excluding students in the medical, law, dental, and graduate schools. Averages have been computed upon the same basis as those for freshmen.

Pi Beta Phi members earned the highest scholastic average for the sorority groups, with 2.81. Acacia led the general fraternities with 3.17, although the spring term records of only seven students were the basis for this computation, since the group occupied a house during the spring term only.

Grades reported.—This office continued to report grades for students in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, the College of Architecture and Design, the School of Education, the School of Forestry and Conservation, the School of Music, and the School of Public Health. For the summer of 1945, 8,814 of these grades were reported, for the fall, 27,749, and for the spring, 33,422.

For almost any University study dealing with scholastic achievement, it would be advantageous to have all grades punched on tabulating cards. At the present time, grades in the six units mentioned above and the Graduate School are handled in this manner. If it does not seem advisable at the present time for all University units to adopt the tabulating cards procedure, it would be advantageous to include grades for students in the College of Engineering, the School of Business Administration, and the College of Pharmacy. This would standardize reporting for all undergraduate and nonprofessional units.

Degrees.—During the year 1945-46, 2,761 degrees in course were conferred. This was an increase of 816 degrees, or 42 per cent, over the number granted in 1944-45. Three units contributed 75 per cent of the 816 gain. Students in the Graduate School were recipients of 251 more degrees in 1945-46 than in 1944-45, students in Literature, Science, and the Arts were recipients of 239, and students in the College of Engineering of 120 more degrees.

For comparison of the number of degrees granted with the total students enrolled, Army trainees in all but the Medical and the Dental School were eliminated since they were not registered on a degree program. On this basis only three units in the University showed a higher ratio of degrees to enrollment in 1945-46 than in 1944-45. One of these, the Medical School, should be eliminated from the discussion because terms of enrollment and dates for conferral of degrees did not correspond from one year to the next or with dates for other University units. Of the other two units showing a higher ratio of degrees to enrollment for 1945-46 over the preceding year, the School of Public Health showed a ratio of 31 per cent in 1945-46 compared to 25 per cent the preceding year, and the Graduate School increased to 18 per cent from 17 per cent in 1944-45. Although the ratio of degrees conferred to students enrolled in the School of Nursing increased for 1945-46, the ratio of degrees and diplomas in Nursing to the enrollment dropped.

In three of the units, the College of Engineering, the College of Architecture and Design, and the School of Education, the ratio of degrees to enrollment did not change, and in each of the remaining seven units the ratio of degrees to enrollment showed a definite drop in 1945-46 from the 1944-45 ratio. The most outstanding decreases were evident in the College of Pharmacy, 24 per cent to 6 per cent, the Law School, 20 per cent to 8 per cent, and the School of Forestry and Conservation, 28 per cent to 16 per cent.

Remarks.—With an increase in credit enrollment of approximately 25 per cent for the year 1945-46, the staff of this office was called upon to meet heavy demands. The addition of so many veterans to our student roster and the intense interest focused upon statistics concerning this group brought many unusual requests for information concerning this student body. Only two of the seven staff members assigned to this department remained throughout the entire 1945-46 period, so that this change in personnel made it difficult to assume the increased load satisfactorily. The future appears to promise more experienced assistants who may be expected to remain for a reasonably long period of time. Although the year 1946-47 will unquestionably bring veterans in greater numbers with consequent increases in enrollment, it is hoped that this office staff may contribute its share to the successful operation of the University.

EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR TABLES II TO XIV

Students in postgraduate professional and extramural noncredit programs are included in the summary, Table I, and are not shown in detail in Tables II through XIV.

Navy trainees attended regular university programs and are therefore counted in the same manner as civilians.

Army trainees have been counted in any unit or for any term upon the basis of their programs and their attendance for any period of time within the term after the two weeks allowed for civilian total refunds or before two weeks prior to the close. Enrollments in the Judge Advocate General's School have been included with other figures for Army registrations.

During the war years, the terms in the Medical School did not coincide with those for other units of the University. Medical students in attendance between the opening and closing term dates for nonmedical University units have been included.

Military personnel, under orders to attend, are not included in Tables XI to XIII.
